

ELECTION

Elections held in more than 200 municipalities statewide

Voters went to the polls in more than 200 municipalities as elections were held to coincide with the state and federal general elections on Nov. 8.

In addition to the municipal officials on the ballot, there were 14 cities that held local referendums on issues ranging from liquor by the drink to wine in grocery stores to local sales tax rates to changes to municipal charters. Of the 201 cities and towns that held elections, five held referendum-only votes.

ADAMS

Incumbent Wayne Evans was unopposed in the race for city commissioner and received 143 votes.

ADAMSVILLE

Incumbent Jackie Hamm will be joined by newcomer Brian Burks on the the Adamsville City Commission after fending off challengers Jeff Pyron and Heather C. Webster. Hamm led the vote count with 407 followed by Burks with 294, Webster with 199, and Pyron with 124.

Jennifer Frazier defeated fellow challenger Brandon Lecker for the unexpired commission seat with Frazier earning 415 votes to Lecker's 158. Frazier had been previously appointed to fill the vacant seat until the election.

ALCOA

Incumbent Tanya Martin will be joined by newcomers Stephen T. Biggar and Josh Blair after defeating fellow challengers Eddie Hall and Jim Hammontree for the three open seats on the Alcoa city commission. Martin led the vote count with 1,137 followed by Biggar with 1,036, Blair with 1,011, Hall with 847, and Hammontree with 694.

Alcoa Mayor Clint Abbott and Commissioner Vaughn Belcher did not seek re-election.

ALGOOD

Voters in Algood approved a referendum allowing wine in grocery stores with 740 voting in favor and 313 voting against.

ALLARDT

Alderwoman Yvonne M. Gernt defeated incumbent Patricia "Pat" Brown Clark for the Allardt mayoral seat. Gernt earned 125 votes to Clark's 117.

Newcomer Jim Wheaton ran unopposed and took the seat formerly held by Gernt with 213 votes.

ALTAMONT

Incumbent Jana Barrett ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Altamont with 163 votes. Incumbent Nina Fults will also be joined by newcomer Caleb Smartt for the two open seats on the Altamont Board of Mayor and Alderman. Fults earned 156 votes while Smartt earned 130.

ARDMORE

Mike Magnusson was re-elected mayor of Ardmore, defeating challengers Wayne Harvell and Jonathan Lee Peters. Magnusson earned 199 votes to Harvell's 96 and Peters' 32.

Incumbent aldermen Jason Sherman and Spencer N. Smith will be joined by Joe Stagner for the three open aldermen positions in Ardmore. Sherman led the vote with 51, Smith with 52, and Stagner with 49.

ATHENS

Incumbent Dick Pelley will be joined by newcomers Larry D. Eaton and Steven S. Sherlin on the

Athens City Council, defeating incumbents Mark Lockmiller and Bo Perkinson along with challengers John M. Duggan, Judy Hamilton, Jim O'Bringer and Kay Simmons for the three open seats.

Eaton led the vote total with 1,407 followed by Pelley with 1,125, Sherlin with 1,087, Simmons with 947, Duggan 858, Perkinson with 799, Lockmiller with 786, O'Bringer with 517, and Hamilton with 467.

ATOKA

Alderman Barry L. Akin ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Atoka with 2,329 votes. Incumbent Mayor W. Daryl Walker did not seek re-election.

Incumbents Daniel Feldmayer and John Harber will be joined by newcomer Christopher S. Schaeffer on the board of aldermen, defeating challengers Daniel T. Lovett, Matt Peters, and Henry Pose for the three open seats. Schaeffer will take the seat occupied by Akin.

Feldmayer led the vote total with 1,291 followed by Harber with 1,046, Schaeffer with 1,013, Posey with 1,002, Peters with 629, and Lovett with 535.

ATWOOD

Newcomer Fridie Algee Jr. defeated fellow challengers Taylor Coulter and Mike Tolley for the mayoral seat in Atwood. Algee earned 111 votes followed by Tolley with 105 and Coulter with 67. Incumbent James Halford did not seek re-election.

Incumbents Jim Lewis and Randall D. Long fended off challenger Christopher James Cannon for the two open aldermen seats. Lewis earned 175 votes, Long 170, and Cannon 126.

BANEHERRY

Incumbents Tom C. Carter and Gary Zander ran unopposed and were re-elected to the two open Baneberry City Commission seats. Carter earned 180 votes and Zander 167.

BARTLETT

Alderman David Parsons defeated challengers Steven Brent Hammonds, John Lackey, and fellow alderman Kevin Quinn for the mayoral seat in Bartlett. Parsons earned 7,646 votes followed by Hammonds with 6,427, Quinn with 4,101, and Lackey with 434. Parsons will take over from Mayor Keith McDonald, who did not seek re-election.

Newcomer Harold Brad King defeated challengers Casper Briggs, Jimmy D. Norman, and Victor Read or the Alderman Position 1 seat previously held by W.C. "Bubba" Pleasant. King garnered 9,197 votes, followed by Briggs with 3,403, Norman with 2,516, and Read with 1,514.

Robert Griffin defeated fellow challengers Stephen Spencer, Thomas Stephen Jr., and Brandon S. Weise for the Alderman Position 2 seat previously held by Mandy Young. Griffin earned 7,675 vote, followed by Weise with 2,994, Spencer with 2,475, and Stephen with 2,207.

David Reaves defeated challenger Paul Kaiser for the Position 3 Alderman seat previously held by Parsons. Reaves earned 9,719 votes to Kaiser's 5,936.

BEAN STATION

Incumbent Ben Waller ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor with 495 votes. Incumbents Mickey Ankrom and Eddie Doulgas also fended off challenger Christopher See **ELECTIONS** on Page 4

Lee re-elected; Ogles wins U.S. 5th district; all state referendums pass

The state of Tennessee has one new member of its congressional delegation while incumbents dominated other federal races and the gubernatorial contest.

In perhaps what was the most contested federal race, Republican Andy Ogles defeated Democrat Heidi Campbell for the U.S. House District 5 seat with Ogles garnering nearly 56% of the vote to Campbell's 42%. Ogles, who presently serves as Maury County mayor, will take the seat that was formerly held by Democrat Jim Cooper who decided not to seek re-election following redistricting.

In other federal races, the remaining eight U.S. congressional seats for the state of Tennessee were retained by incumbent candidates. With Ogles election, U.S. Rep. Steve Cohen becomes the only Democrat among Tennessee's nine-member congressional delegation.

Incumbent Republican Bill Lee defeated Democratic challenger Jason Martin and other eight independent challengers for governor. Lee garnered nearly two-thirds of the vote (64.9%) of the vote while Martin earned nearly one-third (32.9%). The remaining 2% was spread among the field of seven other independent candidates.

In other state elections, Tennesseans will see new faces in three Senate districts and 16 House districts.

Tennesseans also decided the results of four statewide referendums that would amend the Tennessee Constitution with all four amendments passing.

19 Freshmen legislators to join 113th TN General Assembly

Tennesseans will see new faces in three Senate districts and 16 House districts.

New members of the Senate include Republican J. Adam Lowe in District 1, Democrat Charlane Oliver in District 18, and Republican Brent Taylor in District 31.

New State House members include Republican Robert Stevens in District 13, Republican Elaine Davis in District 18, Re-

publican Bryan Richey in District 20, Republican Kevin Raper in District 24, Republican Monty Fritts in District 32, Republican William Slater in District 35, Republican Michael Hale in District 40, Republican Ed Butler in District 41, Democrat Justin Jones in District 52, Democrat Caleb Hemmer in District 59, Republican Gino Bulso in District 61, Republican Jack McCalmon in District 63, Democrat Ronnie Glynn in District

67, Republican Jody Barrett in District 69, Republican Kip Capley in District 71, Republican Jeff Burkhart in District 75, and Republican Brock Martin District 79.

With the death of State Rep. Barbara Cooper, D-Memphis, prior to the election, the State House 86 race will also see a new face. The Shelby County Democratic Party will decide who will fill Cooper's seat.

TN State Senators

TN Senate District 1

J. Adam Lowe (R-Cleveland) was elected to the TN Senate District 1, which encompasses parts of Bradley, Meigs, McMinn and Rhea Counties. A small businessman from Cleveland, he is an educator, author, and former Bradley County Commissioner. Lowe defeated Rep. Mark Hall in the Republican primary to fill the seat left vacant by Sen. Mike Bell (R), who opted not to run for re-election. Lowe, 41, hosts a talk radio program and is an educator who serves as an adjunct professor at Lynchburg, Virginia-based Liberty University, working remotely. Lowe served four years on the Bradley County Commission where he served as vice chairman, chairman of education, and on the committees for finance, law enforcement, and juvenile services. Lowe holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and human development from Lee University; a master's degree in public administration from the University of Tennessee, Chattanooga, and doctorate degree in education leadership and policy from University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

TN Senate District 18

Charlane Oliver (D-Nashville) was elected to District 18, which encompasses parts of Davidson County. She won the seat previously held by Sen. Brenda Gilmore (D), who elected not to run again. Oliver, 39, is a Nashville resident and co-founder and co-executive director of The Equity Alliance, a nonpartisan advocacy organization. She is a former congressional aide to U.S. Congressman Jim Cooper; director of communications with the Williamson County Chamber of Commerce; and marketing coordinator with Meharry Medical College. She holds a bachelor's degree in human and organizational development from Vanderbilt University, Peabody College of Education and Human Development, and masters of public administration from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

TN Senate District 31

Brent Taylor (R-Memphis) was elected to District 31, which encompasses parts of Shelby County. He won the seat previously held by Sen. Brain Kelsey (R), who opted not to run for re-election. Taylor served on the Memphis City Council for 12 years, the Shelby County Commission for three years, and was most recently chairman of the Shelby County Election Commission. Taylor and his wife own and operate the largest family-owned funeral operation in the mid-south.

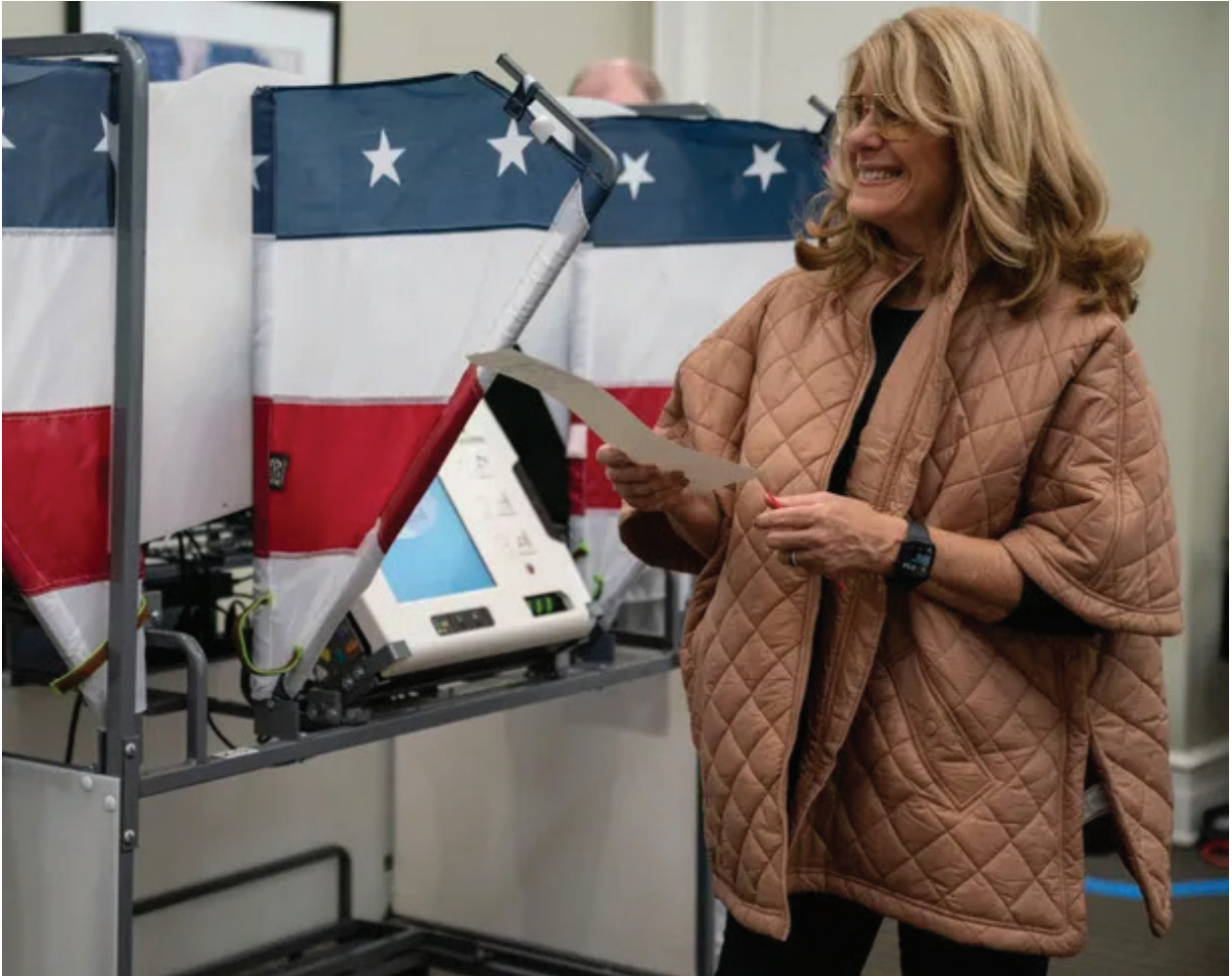

BEERSHEBA SPRINGS
Newcomer Clayton Forsyth defeated fellow challenger Billy R. Miller for the one open seat on the Beersheba Springs City Commission. Forsyth earned 86 votes to Miller’s 25.

BELLE MEADE
Incumbents Rusty Moore and Louise C. Bryan and newcomer Neal Clayton fended off challenger Charley Thornburg for the three open city commission seats in Belle Meade. Moore led the vote count with 1,091 followed by Clayton with 964, Bryan with 887, and Thornburg with 750. Incumbent Bob Weigel did not seek re-election.

BETHEL SPRINGS
John M. Wood defeated fellow alderman Gilbert Atkins and newcomer Kelvin Sanders for the Bethel Springs mayoral seat. Wood led the vote count with 134 followed by Atkins with 43 and Sanders with 39. Incumbent mayor Gary L. Bizzell ran for one of the two open alderman seats and won alongside newcomer Donald Jackson, defeating challenger Pauline Smith. Jackson led the vote total with 129 followed by Bizzell with 123, and Smith 104.

BLAINE
Incumbent Marvin Braden ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Blaine with 458 votes.
Four incumbents also ran unopposed and took the four open alderman seats. Darrell Ray Williams led the vote with 359, Adam Davis with 352, Michael Pitts with 341, and Patsy McElhaney – running as a write-in candidate – earned 19. Davis is the newest member of the board having been appointed to serve the unexpired term of Tyler Braden, who resigned last summer to take a job with the state.

BLUFF CITY
Jeff Broyles ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Bluff City with 312 votes. Broyles had been appointed mayor in August after Mayor Richard Bowling resigning for health reasons.

Incumbent Sandra Madison will be joined by newcomer Ben Adams on the Board of Aldermen. Madison earned 219 votes while Adams earned 257 to earn the two open seats.

BRADEN
Incumbent Chester M. Cocke will be joined by newcomer Mack Green after running unopposed for two open commission seats. Cocke earned 66 votes and Green 60.

BRADFORD
Incumbent Dwayne Reynolds ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor with 231 votes.
Newcomer Paul Richards will join incumbents Jason Adams and Michelle Kirk on board of alderman, defeating challengers Zach Culver, Kaiser, and incumbent Carolyn Thomas. Richards led the vote with 152, followed by Adams with 148, Kirk with 98, Thomas with 97, Culver with 92, and Kiser with 66.

BRISTOL
Incumbent Mark A. Hutton fended off challenger Eric R. Spicer 3,819-2,027 to retain the east district seat on the Bristol City Council. Likewise, incumbent Margaret Feierabend defeated challenger David Warren 3,284-2,715 for the south district seat. Incumbent Lea Powers ran unopposed and was re-elected to the west district seat with 5,173 votes.

BRUCETON
Incumbent Robert T. Keeton III defeated challenger Dallas R. Wade 191-161 to retain the mayoral seat in Bruceton. Incumbent James A. Butler was joined by Jack R. Blocker for the two open alderman seats. Butler earned 310 votes while Blocker garnered 268.

BULLS GAP
Stacy Hayes defeated fellow challenger Charles “Chuck” Johnson 92-79 to take the mayoral seat previously held by Betsy Shipley, who did not seek re-election.
Incumbent Jimmy Sexton and newcomer James W. Riley defeated incumbent Glenn James Snelson for

the two open alderman seats in Bulls Gap. Riley led the vote count with 132, followed by Sexton with 102, and Snelson with 66.

BURLISON
Incumbent Danny H. Howard ran unopposed and was re-elected to the Burlison City Council with 112 votes.

BURNS
Incumbent Chad Tidwell and newcomer Scott Street were elected to the Burns City Commission after running unopposed for the two open seats. Tidwell earned 328 votes and Street 328.

BYRDSTON
Voters in Byrdstown rejected a liquor by the drink referendum 167 to 123.

CALHOUN
Newcomers James Randall Duffy and Victor Keith Gregory ran unopposed for the two open seats on the Calhoun City Commission. Duffy earned 100 votes and Gregory 99.

CARTHAGE
Alderman Steve Babcock defeated fellow alderman Cole Ebel and incumbent Sarah Marie Smith for the mayoral seat in Carthage. Babcock earned 294 votes to Ebel’s 172 and Smith’s 154.
Incumbent Sam Petty will be joined as an alderman by newcomers Casey Elrod and Sam Gray, who ran defeated incumbent Jessica Klaus for the three open seats. Gray led the vote with 372, followed by Elrod with 371, Petty with 375, and Klaus with 166.

CEDAR HILL
Newcomer Marquita Pettus was the sole candidate for the two open city commissioner seats in Cedar Hill and received 52 votes. There were no write-in candidates.

CHURCH HILL
Incumbents Keith Gibson and Michael Walker will be joined by newcomer Kenneth Luster after defeating incumbent Michael Bell for the three open alderman seats in Church Hill. Gibson led the vote count with 1,184, followed by Luster with 915, Walker with 913, and Bell with 907.

CLARKSVILLE
Incumbent Joe Pitts defeated challengers David D. Allen and A.C. Lopez to remain mayor of Clarksville. Pitts earned 14,095 votes to Allen;s 8715 and Lopez’s 2,846
In a write-in only race, Deanna McLaughlin defeated fellow challengers Robert Kirkland, Bill Cody, Bill Doll, and Jeremy Wright for the Ward 2 seat previously held by Vondell Richmond. McLaughlin earned 267 votes, followed by Kirkland with 24, Cody with 7, and Doll and Wright each with 1.
Incumbent Wanda Smith fended off challengers Flora Awuku and Chris Jones to retain the Ward 6 seat. Smith earned 774 votes to Awuku’s 466 and Jones’ 287. In Ward 7, incumbent Travis Holleman defeated challenger Garrett Rye 1,643-1,162 votes while incumbent Stacey Streetman retained the Ward 10 seat over challenger Donald W. Perztborn with 2,993-936 votes.
Three incumbents also ran unopposed and were re-elected to their seats: Ward 1 Councilman Brian Zacharias with 841 votes, Ward 11 Councilman Joe Shakeenab with 1,960 votes, and Ambar Marquis earned 1,437 to retain the Ward 5 unexpired term to which she had previously been appointed.

CLIFTON
Clifton has three new city commission members with Jeff Letson, Michael A. Francis, and Tammy Price defeating fellow challengers Jeremy Davis, James Newcomb, and Gindy Shelby for the three open seats. Letson led the vote with 146 followed by Francis with 130, Prince with 89, Shelby with 77, Newcomb with 75, and Davis with 67.

CLINTON
Incumbent Scott Burton fended off a challenge from Councilmember Zach Farrar to retain his seat as mayor of Clinton with 1,687 votes to 1,024.
In the Ward 1 City Council race, newcomer David W. Qucener defeated challenger Vicki Violette 1,360-1,280 while the Ward 3 seat went to Wendy Maness, who fended

off challengers Harper M. Maxwell and Mitchell “Shoney” Wolfe. Maness earned 1,176 votes to Wolfe’s 794 and Maxwell’s 547.
Incumbent Brian D. Hatmaker ran unopposed and was re-elected to the Ward 2 seat with 2,074 votes.

COALMONT
Incumbent Thomas H. Meeks ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor with 153 votes. Incumbents Dennis Alan Jones and Debra Scissom also ran unopposed for the two open Coalmont Alderman seats with Jones garnering 141 votes and Scissom earning 113.

COLLEGEDALE
Newcomers Morty Lloyd and Tonya Sadler defeated challengers Billy Burnette and former City Manager Ted Rogers for the two open commission seats on Collegedale. Lloyd eared 1,195 votes, Sadler 1,063, Burnette 1,028, and Rogers 667. Lloyd and Sadler will take over seats from outgoing Commissioners Ethan White and Larry Hanson.

COLLIERVILLE
Incumbent Maureen J. Fraser defeated challenger William Boone 11,878-4,784 to retain the position 1 alderman seat. Incumbent Billy Patton also defeated challenger Jewel Jordan 9,680-6,951 to retain the position 2 seat while incumbent Missy Marshall fended off challenger Emily Fulmer 11,672-4,720 for the position 4 seat in Collierville.

COLLINWOOD
Newcomers Shaun Dale Hanback and Kimberly O. McFall ran unopposed and were elected to two open seats on the Collinwood Commission earning 169 and 163 votes respectively.

COLUMBIA
Incumbent Chaz Molder defeated challenger Debbie Matthews 6,057-4,332 to remain mayor of Columbia. Newcomer Randy McBroom defeated fellow challenger Bryant Jackson 5,898-3,516 to take the vice mayor’s seat, which Vice Mayor Dr. Christa Martin retired from.

COOPERTOWN
Incumbent Robert Dale Anderson ran unopposed and was re-elected to the Ward 1 alderman seat with 699 votes. Newcomer Randall Hayes also ran unopposed for the Ward 2 seat and was elected with 594 votes. Incumbent Ward 2 Alderman Kevin Davis did not seek re-election.

CORNERSVILLE
Incumbents Doris Arthur, Mary D. Johnson, and Sherryl McClintock ran unopposed and were re-elected to the three open alderman seats in Cornersville. Arthur led the tally with 233, followed by Johnson with 227, and McClintock with 222. Beth Vick was also elected with 253 to fill the unexpired alderman term to which she had previously been appointed.

COVINGTON
Jan Hensley defeated Alderman John E. Edwards, Alderwoman Johnetta Yarbrough, and challenger Rod Hickman for the mayoral seat in Covington. Hensley earned 1,093 votes followed by Edwards with 500, Yarbrough with 198, and Hickman with 57. Hensley will take the seat from Justin Hanson, who did not seek re-election and will be working with the Tennessee Municipal Bond Fund (TMBF).

Newcomer Martha “Jean” Johnson defeated fellow challenger Jerry Na Nac Hall for the District 1 Alderman seat 208-197. Incumbent Jeff Morris ran unopposed and was re-elected to District 2 with 679 votes while incumbent Danny Wallace defeated challenger Joseph “Jay” Black for the District 3 seat 327-346.

CRAB ORCHARD
Incumbents Kenneth Alley and Mike Findley ran unopposed and were re-elected to alderman seats in Crab Orchard. Alley garnered 137 votes while Findley earned 131.

CROSS PLAINS
Incumbent Barry Faulkner will be joined by newcomer Marlene Graves on the Cross Plains City Commission, defeating incumbent Dianne Sturdivant and challenger Chad Rogers. Faulkner led the vote total with 300 followed by Graves with 226, Rogers with 179, and Sturdivant with 167.
Sam Hastings ran unopposed

and was elected to the one unexpired city commission term with 391 votes.

CROSSVILLE
Newcomer R.J. Crawford ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Crossville with 1,137 votes. Mayor James Mayberry did not seek re-election.

Incumbent Art Gernt will be joined by newcomer Mike Turner who defeated incumbent Rob Harrison for the two open seats on the Crossville City Council. Turner earned 1,523 votes with Gernt garnering 1,414, and Harrison 1,195.

Harvey led the total with 1,257, followed by Dunlap with 1005, Morton with 919, Brock with 912, York with 762, and Richardson with 626.

MEDINA

Incumbents Scottie Betts and Kevin Painter defeated challenger Mary Ellington Varner for the two open alderman seats. Betts led the vote with 766 followed by Painter with 645, and Varner with 311.
Medina voters also voted 743 in favor to 463 against for consumption on the premises.

MEDON

Incumbent Brad Replogle ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Medon with 59 votes while three candidates ran unopposed and were elected to the three open alderman seats. Incumbents Tammy Anthony, Brennan Replogle, and Cathy T. Venables each received 57, 50, and 54 votes respectively.

MEMPHIS

Jana Swearingen-Washington defeated fellow challengers LaTonia Blankenship, Barry Ford, and DeWayne Jackson for the Memphis City Council District 4 seat. Swearingen-Washington eared 6,259 votes, followed by Blankenship with 3,240, Ford with 1,719, and Jackson with 854. Teri Dockery was appointed in September to fill the seat until the election.
Varonica R. Cooper fended off eight other candidates to take the municipal court judge division 2 seat left vacant by the death of long-time Memphis Judge Teresa Jones in January 2021. Cooper led the vote count with 18,706 followed by John Cameron with 15,540, Carolyn Watkins with 15,247, Latonya Sue Burrow with 12,700, Latrena Davis Ingram with 8,404, Patience “Missy” Branham with 7,876, Lynette Hall-Lewis with 7,465, William Larsha Jr. with 4,350, and Christine Stephens with 2,893.

MILAN

Newcomer Jay B. Black fended off fellow challengers Thomas A. Hartigan and Clay McCoy for the ward 1 alderman seat previously held by B.W. Beasley, who did not seek re-election. Black earned 353 votes to Hartigan’s 87 and McCoy’s 324.
Three aldermen also ran unopposed and were re-elected to their seats in Milan: Ward 2 Alderman Lee Alexander with 461 votes, Ward 3 Alderman James Fountain with 270, and Ward 4 Alderwoman Tammy Floyd-Wade with 228.

MILLERSVILLE

Incumbent commissioners David Gregory and Tommy Long fended off challenger Larry Petty for the two open seats. Long led the vote count with 711 followed by Gregory with 521 and Petty with 309.
Milton L. Dorris also defeated challenger Caitlin Duke 535-517 for the unexpired commission term to which Dorris had previously been appointed.

MILLINGTON

Incumbents ran unopposed and won three of the four open alderman races in Millington. Bethany K. Huffman retained the Position 1 seat with 1,857 votes, Al Bell the Position 2 seat with 1,787, and Larry Dagen the Position 4 seat with 1,885. They will be joined by newcomer Chris Ford, who defeated fellow challenger Tom Stephens 1,503-571 for the Position 3 seat previously held by Jon Crisp.

MITCHELLVILLE

Newcomer Jimmie Aaron Green ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Mitchellville by 29 votes. Mayor Bobby Worman did not seek re-election. Incumbent Susan Barber was the only candidate who ran for the three open alderman seats and was elected with 29 votes.

MONTEAGLE

Challenger Greg Maloof defeated incumbent Marilyn Campbell-Rodman with 63% of the vote to Campbell-Rodman's 36% for the mayoral seat in Monteagle.
Incumbents Nate Wilson, Dorraine Parmely, and Jessica Favaloro will be joined on the board of aldermen by Dan Sargent after defeating incumbent Alvin Powell and fellow challengers Kenneth W. Gipson and Darrell G. Smith.

MORRISON

Incumbent Sue Anderson ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Morrison with 92 votes. Incumbent Donald L. Miller will be joined by newcomer Jeannine Miller on the alderman board earning 77 and 71 votes respectively.

MOSCOW

Incumbent Billy Stice Jr. will be joined by newcomers Tony Kennon and Tiffany Johnson after defeating challengers Phoebe Love Hurt and Earnestine Lindsey for the three open alderman seats in Moscow. Kennon led the vote count with 80, followed by Stice with 72, Johnson with 64, and Hurt and Lindsey with 38.

MOUNT CARMEL

Incumbents John K. Gibson and James L. Gilliam will be joined by newcomer Jim Bare as aldermen for Mount Carmel after defeating challenger Donnie Lee Sexton. Gibson led the vote count with 800 followed by Bare with 764, Gilliam with 743, and Sexton with 568. Bare will take the seat from incumbent Steve McLain, who did not seek re-election.

MOUNTAIN CITY

Incumbent Lawrence C. Keeble will be joined by newcomer Jason Bryan on the Mountain City alderman board after defeating fellow challenger Meagan Rio Stevans. Keeble earned the most votes with 379 followed by Bryan with 357 and Stevans with 319.

MT. JULIET

Incumbents Bill Trivett and Jennifer Milele both ran unopposed and were elected to the respective District 2 and District 4 Commission seats. Trivett earned 2,195 votes while Milele garnered 2,676.

MT. PLEASANT

Incumbent Mike Davis will be joined by newcomer Pam Johnston on the Mt. Pleasant City Commission, defeating incumbent Eric Harvey and challengers Larry C. Chapman and Jake Sykes. Davis led the vote count with 524, followed by Johnston with 398, Chapman with 386, Harvey with 320, and Sykes with 202.

MUNFORD

Incumbent Jack Bomar will be joined by newcomers Steve Childress and Richard Cramer after defeating challengers Tony Gutowski and Carl Robertson for the three open seats on the Munford Board of Aldermen. Bomar led the vote count with 984 followed by Childress with 824, Cramer with 589, Gutowski with 508, and Robertson with 448.

NEW HOPE

Incumbent Alderman Billy Frame will be joined by newcomer Jimmy Hickernut Beavers on the alderman board for New Hope after running unopposed.

NEW MARKET

Incumbents Frank Solomon and Lori Stiner Tucker fended off challenger Wayne Guinn to retain their seats on the New Market Board of Alderman. Solomon led the vote total with 235, followed by Tucker with 209, and Guinn with 194.

NEW TAZEWELL

Three candidates ran unopposed and were re-elected in New Tazewell. Incumbent Stanley Leonard received 378 votes to retain the Ward 1 alderman seat, newcomer Nina Louthan garnered 363 votes in the Ward 2 race, while incumbent Charles DeBusk earned 389 in the Ward 3 race.

NEWBERN

Incumbents Michael Keith Hardin and Tim Ware will be joined by newcomer Kim Sammons as aldermen for Newbern. Hardin led the vote with 212 followed by Ware with 201 and May with 190.

NEWPORT

Incumbent Roland A. Dykes III ran unopposed and retained his mayoral seat with 1,168 votes.
On the board of aldermen, incumbents Mike Hansel, Louanna Ottinger, and Steve Smith will be joined by newcomers Connie Ball and Randy Ragan, defeating challengers Everett Biddle, Forest Clevenger, and Bill Costner. Incumbents Mike Proffitt and Bobby Knight did not seek re-election.
Ball led the vote with 874 followed by Ottinger with 753, Ragan with 729, Smith with 611, Hansel with 606, Costner with 504, Clevenger 480, and Biddle 418.

NIOTA

Incumbent Lois Preece defeated challenger Cassandra Nowotnik 158-43 to remain mayor of Niota. Newcomers Tony Manney and Mark Ward ran unopposed for the two open city commission seats and were elected. Ward earned 137 and Manney earned 122.
Niota citizens also voted in favor of permitting the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises with 117 voting for and 92 against.

NOLENSVILLE

Newcomers Jessica Salamida and Kate Cortner defeated incumbent Lisa L. Garramone for the two open Nolensville commission seats. Salamida earned 2,777 votes followed by Cortner with 2,535, and Garramone with 2,311.

NORMANDY

Incumbent Charles B. Whitaker ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Normandy with 24 votes. Incumbent Jerry Spivey also defeated newcomer Valinda Seese with 15 votes to her 7 in the single alderman seat race.

NORRIS

Five candidates ran unopposed and were elected to the open seats on the Norris City Council. Incumbents Bill Grieve, William Grinder, Chris Mitchell, and Loretta Painter will be joined by Charles P. Nicholson after incumbent Robert Sain did not seek re-election. Grinder earned 496 votes, Nicholson 495, Mitchell 494, Grieve 468, and Painter 460.

OAK RIDGE

Incumbents Warren Gooch and Ellen Smith will be joined by former councilman L.C. “Charlie” Hensley and newcomer Sean Gleason after incumbents Rick Chinn and Kelly Callison did not seek re-election in Oak Ridge. Hensley earned the most votes with 6,349 followed by Gooch with 6,276, Smith with 6,193, Gleason with 5,860, and another challenger, Carmen DeLong, only receiving 5,091 and missing out on a seat.
Voters in Oak Ridge also cast their ballots for two amendments to the city’s charger. Residents voted 7,208 for to 2,059 against allowing the city to publish summaries of the council meetings on the city’s website instead of in local newspapers. The second amendment saw residents vote 7,721 in favor and 1,449 against allowing digital media to be implemented for official public notices by the city.

OAKLAND

Incumbent Franklin E. Cates will be joined by newcomers Debbie Hummell and Adrian Wiggins in the three open alderman seats in Oakland after defeating incumbent Gregory Duncan and challengers Danny L. Bailey, Judy F. Chapman-Miller, Harry P. Dike, Mark Dimmock, Hayes Laughlin, and James Vlasaty.
Hummel led the vote count with 832, followed by Wiggins with 822, Cates with 710, Bailey with 605, Vlasaty with 595, Chapman-Miller with 528, Dike with 516, Duncan with 499, Laughlin with 457, and Dimmock with 338.

OBION

Incumbent Rodney Underwood defeated challenger Angela Beemer 166-123 to remain mayor of Obion. Incumbents Patsy Barker and Steve Sherfield will be joined by newcomers Susie Evans, Terry Ledbetter, Shane DePriest, and Dawn Priest after defeating challengers Betsy Long, Bobby Lucas, Richard Lyons, and Butch Taylor for the six open alderman seats. Incumbents Robert Anderson, David Gordon, Jason Parnell, and Christina Romo did not seek re-election.

Barker led the vote count with 184 followed by Evans with 176, Ledbetter with 156, DePriest with 150, Priest with 149, Sherfield with 143, Long with 124, Lucas with 122, Taylor with 108, and Lyons with 107.
Obion voters also rejected a referendum allowing consumption on the premises 152-140.

OLIVER SPRINGS

Challenger and Alderman Jason Stiltner defeated incumbent mayor Omer Cox 539-213 for the Oliver Springs Mayoral seat.
Meanwhile, incumbent Robert L. Miller ran unopposed for the Ward 1 seat while Jeffery L. Bass ran unopposed for the Ward 2 seat with both being re-elected. NO candidate qualified for the Ward 4 seat.

ORLINDA

Newcomers Ben Ellis and Walter Lee will join incumbent Sherry Carver on the Orlinda City Commission. Ellis led the vote for the three open positions with 144 followed by Carver with 117 and Lee with 100.
Jennifer Johnson also defeated fellow challenger J.W. Rogers 129-83 for the unexpired city commission seat.

ORME

Incumbents Jerry Godsby and Anthony Scott Reames were the only two candidates who ran for the three open seats on the Orme City Commission, earning 14 and 13 votes respectively.

PALMER

No candidate qualified to run for the mayoral seat in Palmer. The seat was previously held by Daniel Crabtree.
Newcomer Wanda Clark was the only candidate who ran for the two open aldermen seats and won with 75 votes. Newcomer Rosanna M. Cleek defeated Darlene Brooks, who had been appointed to the seat, and Venessa Guffey Cleek for the unexpired alderman term. Rosanna Cleek earned 77 votes to Cleek’s 66.

PARIS

Incumbent Sam Tharpe will be joined by newcomers Kathy Ray and Vickey Roberts on the Paris Commission after incumbents Carlton Gerrell and Gayle Griffith decided not to run again. Tharpe earned 1,350 votes followed by Ray with 1,317, and Roberts with 1,175.

PARROTTSVILLE

Incumbent Ronnie Hommell will be joined by newcomers Gayla Ann Hommell and Dennis Worley for the three open commissioner seats. Gayla Hommell earned 39 votes followed by Ronnie Hommell with 36, and Worley as a write-in with 3.

PIPERTON

Newcomers Russ Fletcher and Bret Morris ran unopposed and were elected to the two open commissioner seats in Pierton, Fletcher with 762 votes and Morris with 849.

PITTMAN CENTER

Incumbent Jerry R. Huskey ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Pittman Center with 147 votes while incumbents Kevin R. Howard and John Steve McCarter retained their aldermen seats with 143 and 140 votes respectively.

PLEASANT HILL

Newcomer Don Dowdy ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Pleasant Hill with 172 votes, taking over from former Mayor Lisa Patrick. Incumbents Peggy Happy and Marvin Steelman ran unopposed and were re-elected to the city council earning 163 and 136 votes respectively.

PLEASANT VIEW

Incumbents Bruce Drake and Danny Rediker ran unopposed and were re-elected to their alderman seats in Pleasant View with 1,063 and 1,109 votes respectively. Pleasant View voters also rejected a sales tax referendum 888 against to 628 for.

PORTLAND

Incumbent Mike Callis defeated challenger Charles Cole to retain the mayoral seat in Portland. Callis earned 1,346 votes to Cole’s 280.
Incumbents Mike Hall, Drew Jennings, and Megann D. Thompson fended off challengers Latoya Holcomb, Dewel Scruggs, and Lloyd Dunn to retain their alderman seats. Hall and Jennings led the vote

total with 911 followed by Thompson with 771, Holcomb with 662, Scruggs with 579, and Dunn 331.
Portland voters also defeated a sales tax referendum with 1,056 voting against and 764 voting for the measure.

POWELLS CROSSROADS

Incumbent Dwight Richards ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Powells Crossroads. Incumbent Greg Davis defeated Terry Lawson for the regular alderman seat while Trevor Lawson defeated Ruth Toon 63% to 36% for the unexpired term.

PULASKI

Newcomer J.J. Brindley defeated fellow challengers John Amlaner and Larry Worsham to be mayor of Pulaski. Brindley earned 1,124 votes to Worsham’s 536 and Amlaner’s 52. Incumbent mayor Pat Ford did not seek re-election.
Incumbents Patricia “Pat” Miles and Jerry Bryant will be joined by newcomer Janice Marks Tucker on the Pulaski Board of Aldermen, defeating fellow challengers Tammy Mathis, Toy A. Gentry, and Tasha D. Williams. Miles led the vote count with 641 followed by Tucker with 639, Bryant with 925, Gentry with 719, Mathis with 563, and Williams with 569.

PURYEAR

Incumbents Mitch Sykes and Telus Mackie Gallimore fended off challenger Dale King for two open alderman seats. Sykes and Gallimore each received 87 and 79 votes respectively followed by King with 73. Tommy Roberts also received 112 votes to serve the unexpired alderman term he was appointed to after the death of former alderman Bill Robinson in March.

RAMER

Newcomers Anthony Locke and Chris Sweeney took two of the three open seats on the Ramer City Commission. Locke led the count with 66 followed by Sweeney with 61.

RED BANK

Newcomer Hayes T. Wilkinson fended off fellow challenger Jeff Price for the at-large commission seat in Red Bank with 1,727 to 1,690 votes.
Incumbent and Red Bank Mayor Hollie Berry defeated challenger Dari Owens 2,335-1,137 for the city commission District 1 seat while newcomer Jamie Fairbanks-Harvey defeated fellow challenger Lawrence Miller 1,824-1,561 for the district 3 seat.

RIDGESIDE

Incumbent Darian Collins will be joined by newcomers Katy Ingvalson and Maria W. Thompson on the Ridgeside City Commission, defeating challengers Fred B. Flint and Robert E. Steel. Ingvalson led the vote county with 165, followed by Collins with 131, Thompson with 117, Flint with 102, and Steel with 101. Ingvalson and Thompson will take over from Mayor Kirk Walker and Commissioner Drue Zaharis, who did not seek re-election.

RIDGETOP

Tim Shaw ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Ridgetop with 484 votes. Incumbent mayor Kirk Walker did not seek re-election.
More new faces on the Ridgetop Board of Aldermen include Kim S. Martin and Monty Gregory, who defeated fellow newcomer David Gilmore for the two open seats. Martin led the vote with 313 followed by Gregory with 295, and Gilmore with 284. John Senft ran unopposed for a 2-year unexpired term and was elected.

ROCKWOOD

After Mayor Mike Miller did not seek re-election, Jason Jolly defeated fellow challengers Dudley J. Evans and Tim Robinson for the seat. Jolly earned 574 to Robinson’s 267 and Evans 221 votes.
Stephen Allen Bryant will be the sole incumbent returning to the Rockwood City Council along with newcomers Mike Reed and Larry Davis, defeating challengers Roland Cook, Glen Gabriel, Edward B. Grief, and Randy Kirby. Reed led the tally with 573 followed by Davis with 544, Byrant with 485, Kirby with 387, Gabriel with 354, Cook with 250, and Grief with 210.

Two new faces will also join the Rocky Top City Council. Jeff Gilliam ad Mack Bunch defeated fellow changers Denise Casteel, Richard Dawson, and Tom Devaney for the two spots. Gilliam led the vote count with 277, followed by Bunch with 210, Casteel with 76, Dawson with 45, and Devaney with 39.

ROSSVILLE
Incumbents Zack Moore and Bobby Williams will be joined by newcomer Jeffery Wooden as aldermen for Rossville, running unopposed for the three open seats. Moore led the count with 401, followed by Williams with 376, and Wooden with 349.

Additionally, incumbent Benny Atkins will be joined by newcomer Randy Tub Holt for the two open Ward 2 seats. Both Atkins and Holt earned 74 votes.

SAMBURG
Incumbents Ralph Alexander, Mitchell Goree and Grant Reed ran unopposed and were re-elected aldermen in Samburg with 42, 30, and 37 votes respectively.

SAVANNAH
Newcomer Stephen B. Johnson will join incumbent Steve Blake White on the Savannah City Commission, defeating challenger Ron Shank for the two open seats. Johnson led the vote total with 723 followed by White with 654, and Shank with 489. Incumbent Wes Wilkerson did not seek re-election.

In the Ward 2 race, incumbent Marilyn Ewing ran unopposed and was re-elected with 243 votes.

SOMERVILLE
Newcomer Zachary Bryson defeated incumbent Jason Lee Hamilton 467-174 for the position 4 alderman seat in Somerville. Position 5 incumbent Judy Accardi ran unopposed and garnered 598 votes while Position 6 incumbent James Lofties ran unopposed and earned 646 votes.

SOUTH FULTON
Incumbents Billy Williams and Tommy Pruett ran unopposed and were re-elected. Williams received 88 votes for his Ward 2 seat while Pruett earned 58 for his Ward 3 seat. South Fulton voters also approved a referendum for consumption on the premises 242-103 against.

STANTON
Incumbent Allan Sterbinsky fended off challenger William Russell Adams 63-14 to remain mayor of Stanton.

Newcomer Norman E. Bauer Jr. will join incumbents Robert “Rooster” Dancy, Linda L. Jones, and Laura P. Smith as aldermen for Stanton after Ward Smith decided to not seek re-election. Jones led the vote count with 72 followed by Dancy with 65, Smith with 60, and Bauer with 56.

SUNBRIGHT
Incumbent Buddy Tharp ran unopposed and received 98 votes for alderman.

SURGOINSVILLE

Running unopposed in their races, incumbent Russel DeBusk retained his Ward 1 seat with 340 votes while Vice Mayor Betsy Shoffner kept the Ward 3 seat with 335.

TELLICO PLAINS
Incumbent Marilyn F. Parker ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Tellico Plains with 192 votes.

In the alderman race, incumbents Robert Hamilton and Cynthia McDaniel will be joined by newcomers Shannon Harris and Courtney Millsaps, who defeated Joyce A. McDaniel for the four open seats. Incumbent Perry Blake did not seek re-election. Hamilton led the vote tally with 155 followed by Harris with 153, Millsaps with 149, Cynthia McDaniel with 119 and Joyce McDaniel with 113.

Incumbent Jo Cagle ran unopposed and was re-elected city recorder with 106 votes.

Tellico Plains residents also voted 149 for to 92 against for permitting consumption on the premises and 153 for to 89 against permitting retail package stores to sell alcohol.

THOMPSON’S STATION
Alderman Brian Stover ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Thompson’s Station with 2,355 votes after Cory Napier did not seek re-election. Incumbent Shaun Alexander and newcomer Bob Whitmer were elected to the two open aldermen seats with 2,240 and 2,090 votes respectively.

Thompson’s Station residents also approved allowing retail package stores to sell alcohol 2,068 to 658.

THREE WAY
Two incumbents ran unopposed and were re-elected in Three Way. May Larry W. Sanders received 636 votes while Alderwoman Mary Ann Tremblay received 628.

TIPTONVILLE
Incumbent Cliff Berry Jr. defeated challenger Donnie Ray Johnson 399-88 to remain mayor of Tiptonville.

Incumbents Will C. Jackson, Mario Montgomery, Daisy Parks, and Joe Lee Williams will be joined by newcomers Macky Wilson and Dewayne Haggard as aldermen for Tiptonville after defeating incumbent Sarah A. Woods and Philip Michael Kimble. Haggard led the vote count with 329 followed by Wilson with 319, Montgomery with 291, Parks with 273, Jackson with 235, Williams with 233, Woods with 229, and Kimble with 200. Incumbent Jamie Beal did not seek re-election.

TRACY CITY
SittingAlderwomanStacieHutcheson defeated challenger Gary P. Day with 224 votes to Day’s 142 for the Tracy City mayoral seat. Incumbent Mayor Nadene F. Moore did not seek re-election.

Incumbent alderwoman Sara G. Brown will also be joined by Theron E. Gross, defeating fellow challenger Doug Hankins for the two open seats on the board. Brown led the vote total with 241 followed by Gross with 198 and Hankins with 169.

TRENTON
Tony Burriss ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Trenton with 722, taking over from previous mayor Ricky Jackson who did not seek re-election.

Incumbents Cece Jones and Bill Wade will be joined by newcomers Peyton Harper, Rickey L. Graves, Kim Holt, and Myra D. Elam after defeating incumbent Frank Gibson and challengers Sam Doaks, Bob Howland, Cynthia Jarrett, Joseph Moore, Brian Peay, and Byran Z. Wilson for the six open alderman seats in Trenton.

Jones led the vote total with 669 followed by Wade with 460, Harper with 444, Graves with 422, Holt with 399, Elam with 376, Gibson with 341, Moore with 320, Jarrett with 300, Doaks with 287, Peay with 133, and Howland with 77. Michael Abbott did not seek re-election.

TREZEVANT
Incumbents Don Barger, Dan Dieringer, and Pamela D. Joyner fended off challenger Steve Richardson for the three open alderman seats in Trezevant. Joyner led the vote with



114, followed by Barger with 106, Dieringer with 90, and Richardson with 57.

TROY
Newcomer Mark Watson ran unopposed and was elected mayor of Troy with 276 votes after incumbent Bruce Cruce did not seek re-election.

Incumbent aldermen Lana Wiseman Carson, Kristi Scarborough, and Matt Russell will be joined by newcomers Phil Green, and Chris Jones after incumbents Daniel Pardue and Ross Clark did not seek re-election. Carson led the vote count with 245 followed by Russell with 235, Scarborough with 228, Green with 223, and Green with 197.

TUSCULUM
Incumbent commissioner Mike Burns ran unopposed and was re-elected in Tusculum.

UNICOI
Incumbent Wanda Radford will be joined by Kevin McInturff for the two open alderman seats in Unicoi, defeating incumbent Judy Ray and challengers Richard E. Dorris, Billy R. Harkins Jr., Kim Hampton Rutherford, and Rocky McInturff.

Kevin McInturff led the vote count with 578, followed by Radford with 485, Ray with 375, Rocky McInturff with 192, Rutherford with 183, Dorris with 148, and Harkins with 116.

UNION CITY
Incumbent Jimmy Rippy defeated challenger Ethan McGee 143-94 to keep the Ward 1 council seat while newcomer Hal Mosier defeated incumbent Cody Martin 164-131 for the Ward 4 seat.

Incumbent Terry L. Hailey ran unopposed and was re-elected to his at-large council seat with ,1773 votes.

VANLEER
Heath Ellis ran unopposed and was elected Vanleer mayor with 69 votes.

Incumbent aldermen Chris Farmer, Elizabeth Farmer, and Dwight McIlwain will be joined by newcomers Jerry Jenkins and Kevin Miner in Vanleer after incumbents Mike Gilmore and Ruben Schmittou did not seek re-election. All five candidates were unopposed. Jenkins led the vote count with 64 followed by McIlwain with 62, C. Farmer and Miner each with 60, and E. Farmer with 57.

VONORE
Incumbent John Hammontree ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor with 383 votes. Newcomers Alisa Millsaps Hobbs and Dennis Steve Wheeler received 275 and 260 votes respectively to earn the two open alderman seats while Tim Swafford ran unopposed and received 353 votes to earn the sole unexpired term seat.

WALDEN
Newcomer Angela Cassidy defeated fellow challenger Thomas Grady Gallant 557-352 for the one open alderman seat in Walden. Voters in the town also cast their ballots 785 for, 146 against a referendum for consumption on the premises.

WARTRACE
In Wartrace, alderman Brian Ross defeated fellow alderman Allan Tabit 118-63 for mayor after incumbent Cindy Drake did not seek re-election. Tabit and Ross’ seats were taken by Shelia Ledere and Stacy Roach, who each earned 122 and 120 votes respectively.

WATAUGA
Incumbent Delisha H. Lafleur will be joined by Mickey Fair on the Watauga City commission, running unopposed for the two open seats. Fair earned 61 votes and Lafleur 58.

Bert Thomasson earned 73 votes running unopposed for the unexpired commission term to which he had previously been appointed.

WATERTOWN
Incumbents Caleb Barrett and Howell Roberts will be joined by newcomer Kyle Stacey on the Watertown board of aldermen after Kristie Bayes Cantrell did not seek re-election. Barrett led the vote count with 223 followed by Roberts with 216 and Stacey with 216.

WESTMORELAND
Alderman David Leath defeated incumbent James Brian Smalling and challenger Bill “Marty” Cothron for the mayoral seat in Westmoreland. Leath earned 309 votes to Smalling’s 128 and Cothron’s 107.

Incumbent alderman Doug Brown will be joined by newcomer Adam Borders with the two open alderman seats. Both earned 390 votes. Incumbents Cameron Calvert and Alex Jones also ran unopposed for the two unexpired terms as aldermen. Jones earned 384 votes and Calvert 379.

WHITE BLUFF
Incumbent Connie W. Reed will be joined by newcomers Scott G. Glover and Carl Kincaid after defeating challengers Kevin Dugan, Drew Harsh, Trey Thomas, and Thea Martin for the three open council seats in White Bluff. Reed led the total with 421 followed by Glover with 392, Kincaid with 319, Thomas with 298, Dugan with 286, Martin with 266, and Harsh with 102.

WHITE HOUSE
John Corbitt defeated fellow alderman Clif Hutson 1,470-761 to take the mayoral seat from retiring White House Mayor Farris Bibb.

Newcomer Sam Matthews defeated fellow challenger Will Green 383-309 for the vacant Ward 1 seat while Jana Singler Spicer received 727 running unopposed for the Ward 2 seat previously held by Carlos Payne. Joseph Zanger ran unopposed and was re-elected city judge with 1,398 votes.

WHITE PINE
Incumbent Tyler L. Marshall will be joined by newcomers Josh Sinard and Whitney Woods on the White Pine Board of Alderman, all fending off challenger Robin Parker for the three open seats. Sinard led the vote total with 288 followed by Marshall with 286, Woods with 241, and Parker with 175.

WHITWELL
Two write-in candidates grabbed the two open commission seats in Whitwell with newcomer William Adams earning 39 votes and incumbent Mike Dillon 18.

WHITEVILLE
Residents in Whiteville rejected a referendum for consumption on the premises 171-185 but approved a referendum for retail package stores 183 to 75.

WILLISTON
Incumbent Audrey McQueen will be joined by newcomer James O. Wiles as a city commissioner for Williston after Donna Fortune did not seek re-election. McQueen received 70 votes for one of the two open seats while Wiles received 63 for the other.

WINFIELD
Jeff Dodson ran unopposed and was re-elected mayor of Winfield with 203 votes.

Newcomer Melvin R. Stephens will join incumbent Harold L. Chambers as an alderman for Winfield after defeating incumbent Chad Jones and challenger Adam Shinkle for the two open seats. Stephens led the vote with 139 followed by Chambers with 105, Jones with 98, and Shinkle with 73.
